**Material for the speech of Secretary (Textiles)
at 13th Council Meeting of IJSG**

I take this opportunity to welcome the delegates and thank them all for making it convenient to participate in the thirteenth session of the Council of International Jute Study Group at Dhaka. IJSG is about ten years old and it has always tried hard to achieve its mandated objectives as laid down in the terms of reference. The IJSG has given focus to its primary objective of providing an effective framework for international cooperation, consultation and policy development among the members with regard to all relevant aspects of the world jute economy, and to promote the expansion of international trade in jute and jute products by maintaining existing markets and by developing new markets, including the introduction of new jute products and the development of new end-uses, along with addressing the issues of poverty alleviation, employment and development of human resources, particularly women, in the jute sector. IJSG has achieved considerable success in these areas.

I would like to re-iterate the importance of Public Private Partnership (PPP) in promotion of the natural fibres sector. It is an important instrument for achieving growth with equity and inclusiveness. This would also help in attracting more number of associate members as well as member countries in a bigger way. IJSG plays a very important role to address the issues of poverty alleviation, employment and development of human resources, particularly women engaged in the jute sector.

IJSG Projects:

The two very important on-going projects of IJSG which are sponsored by CFC are **“Increased Production Efficiency in Small holder Kenaf Production Systems for Specific Industrial Applications”** and **“Development and Application of Potentially Important Jute Geo-textiles.** The first project involving Bangladesh, Malaysia and China is a four-year project while the second is to be implemented in Bangladesh, India and UK within a five-year time frame. The jute geo-textiles project is of great significance for the expansion of domestic and international markets for jute products especially in European countries.

Further the project on Skill Development of Supervisors and Technologists of Jute Industry targets a crucial area of jute goods production system, which would lead to improvement in both efficiency and quality parameters.

It may be mentioned that non-woven technology is cost-effective as compared to woven technology and large scale adoption of such technology would entail substantial reduction in cost of production. I am pleased to know that IJSG has already taken up a project on Jute Thermoplastic components for Automotive and other continuous Profile Applications.

One of the primary concerns in today's world is the environment issues. Jute as an environment friendly natural fibre can address such concern of the international community. Therefore, IJSG as the only international commodity board in jute sector should shoulder the responsibility of placing

jute sector in its important position of an environment friendly packaging material and host of other house hold and industrial items. Accordingly steps need to be taken to consolidate the marketing potential of jute on this aspect. The exploration of procedures for **Earning Carbon Credit through Jute Cultivation will be a boost for such activities.**

An area of vital importance catered by IJSG is to create and increase awareness of the beneficial effects of the use of jute as an environmentally friendly, renewable and biodegradable natural fibre. The use of mineral-oil based batching oil in the process of manufacturing jute bags used for packaging Cocoa Beans, Coffee Beans, Shelled Nuts etc. has been a matter of concern for the final consumers due to alleged and possible hydro-carbon contamination of such bags. At the initiative of India and Bangladesh, erstwhile IJO formulated an International Standard for testing of jute bags manufactured with hydro carbon free (vegetable) oil instead of mineral based oil. The standard was revised in 2005 by the IJSG and was subsequently implemented by India and Bangladesh which immensely helped in overcoming the concerns of the overseas buyers. Undertaking the present project on **Development of Rapid Test Method for Determination of Un-saponifiable in Food Grade Jute Products** is a continuation of the good and effective work done by IJSG in this respect.

As jute and kenaf are internationally traded agricultural commodity and IJSG has a mandate to facilitate such trade it will be imperative to give a larger focus to resolve the issues of trade barriers through process of consultation with governments and trade associations of importing countries. For this purpose it is important to up-date and up-grade the Harmonized Code of jute and jute products, which would be accepted globally. I am happy to note that IJSG has already taken some positive steps in this regard.

As an international body, the need for having more members is very important for IJSG. The objectives of IJSG would be fulfilled only when we can bring a larger number of stakeholder nations into the fold of IJSG. However, even after seven to eight years we have not been able to increase the membership of this group despite sincere efforts from IJSG secretariat in the past.

IJSG is an important international centre for information collection and dissemination about various aspects of jute and jute products and I appreciate the new website launched by IJSG which is much more user-friendly and informative. In this connection I would also stress upon the need of the periodic updation and circulation of publications like **"Jute Matters"** to all members and associate members regularly.

IJSG can play a very important role in publishing market surveys of potential markets highlighting in particular their specific requirements. For instance, Africa has substantial production of commodities and was a major buyer of jute packaging. IJSG surveys can offer roadmap for regaining old markets and exploring new ones through promotional measures addressing specific market requirements. Similar initiatives in South America could also help regain lost markets. Overall, the objective should be to regain lost markets and create new markets for jute products.

Area(s) of Focus:

Agriculture: The biggest challenge today is to increase availability of raw jute and also to increase availability of higher grade raw jute. In quantitative term by and large production of raw jute in India as well as in Bangladesh has come to saturation / stagnation level of around 100-110 lakh bales and 55-60 lakh bales respectively. The demand of jute fibre has increased over the years and therefore the challenge is to increase the production to at least 120 to 150 lakh bales in India and 75 to 100 lakh bales in Bangladesh to meet the increased demand. Similarly one of the main factors responsible for quality of raw jute is the process of fibre extraction, At present the age old retting process is being followed by the farmer for this purpose. The next generation is shying away from jute cultivation because of the physically demanding retting practices. We need to come out with innovative fiber extraction methodology either by way of adopting some of the best practices being followed in other countries for extraction of similar kind of natural fibre such as sisal or develop our own methodology.

Industry: As we all aware that jute industry is still running on 60 years old process technology. Little advancement in form of better process technology has taken place in jute industry as compared to other natural fibres such as cotton. Moreover the bulk of the current production of jute industry is of woven type. Only a handful of composite jute mill have diversified and started production of jute goods made from non-woven technology. Large scale adoption on non-woven technology, which is cost effective as compared to woven technology, is needed. Therefore we need to take projects in partnership with renowned international machine manufacturer in these vital areas of the jute value chain.

IJSG should play vital catalytic role and come out with suitable projects on these areas. We can assure that Governments of the Member countries will extend all support to IJSG for execution of these projects in their respective nations.

Before I conclude, I offer my thanks to the honorable members, distinguished observers and participants for their genuine interest towards the IJSG and natural fibers. I hope that these deliberations will help in charting the future course of actions for the sustained development of the jute sector, bring out and lay down certain milestones for development and be able to initiate the efforts in this direction.

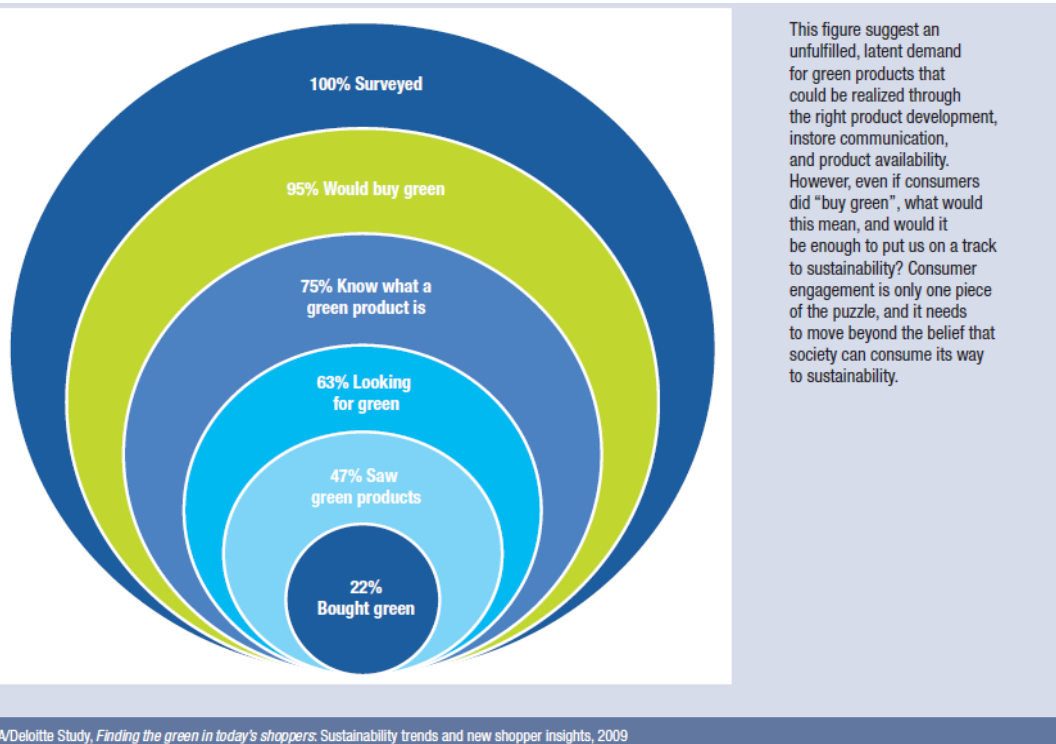
